ELK GROVE 2025 INTERACTIVE PROJECT MAP

Earlier this year, the Mayor and Board of Trustees established Elk Grove 2025 to meet Elk Grove Village's needs today and well into our future. This decision continues the Board's commitment to investing to ensure the community thrives for decades to come. Elk Grove 2025 is a long-range capital plan, which includes public facility improvements, road improvements, streetscaping, bicycle/pedestrian projects, and drainage projects.

MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

As we approach the end of the year and reflect back on 2017, it is difficult to believe how much has happened in the Village in so short a time. We're proud to say it has been another successful year for our community!

LEAF DISPOSAL LOCATIONS

Leaves should be placed in a yard waste collection bag, a landscape waste sticker is NOT required. Please note that plastic bags are not allowed. The dumpsters are for leaves only, yard waste is not permitted. HOLIDAY LIGHTS RECYCLING

The Village is accepting unused and non-working holiday string lights and extension cords as part of the SWANCC Holiday Lights Recycling Program. SWANCC and participating communities have partnered with Elgin Recycling Inc. to recycle the lights and cords.

BEWARE OFFERS FROM ELECTRIC SUPPLIERS

In Illinois, there are at least 96 alternative retail electric suppliers (ARES) authorized to sell electricity in Illinois. Data shows their customers are paying higher prices than customers with traditional utilities such as ComEd. According to the Illinois Commerce Commission, ARES customers in the ComEd territory as a whole have paid more than \$152 million more for electricity than traditional utility customers from June 1, 2016 through May 31, 2017.

The Illinois Attorney General urges residents to do the following before signing on with an ARES:

- Do not share your utility bill to someone who comes to your door. A marketer must ask for written authorization to access your meter usage.
- Request all marketing offers in writing and do not enroll on the spot, especially if someone comes to your door.
- If you are interested in an alternative pricing plan (such as a variable rate), make sure that you read all of the fine print and that the lower rate is not just an introductory rate.
- Be wary of any offer that promises or guarantees savings.
- Always ask about any monthly fees or additional charges.
- No alternative supplier is affiliated with or endorsed by your utility or the government. If you sign up for service with an alternative supplier, you are entering a new contract with a different company.



DOOR TO DOOR SOLICITORS

All persons seeking to solicit within our Village, other than religious or political organizations that are protected under the First Amendment, are required to apply for a Certificate of Registration with the Village. This does not include people who are exclusively distributing flyers. Although the Village registers solicitors it does not endorse or support the company or product being solicited.

Village Ordinance requires the individual to apply with the Village Clerk's Office prior to doing any door-to-door business in the Village. The Village reviews the application and conducts a background check of each individual. Upon approval, the applicant is issued a Solicitor Identification Card, which must be visibly displayed at all times while soliciting in the Village. Identification cards include a photo of the solicitor, their name and permit expiration date. Uninvited solicitors or suspicious individuals who cannot provide proof of solicitor registration should be



"solicitor, whether registered with the Village or not, is permitted to engage in "soliciting" prior to 9 a.m. or after 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday, or at any time on Sundays or on a state or national holidays.

Residents may display a "No Solicitor Invited" sign upon or near the main entrance door of their residence as notice to any solicitor that the occupant does not wish to interact with the solicitor. "NO SOLICITORS INVITED" decals are available at the Village Clerk's Office. Residents may contact the Village Clerk at 847-357-4040 for further information.






ELK GROVE 2025, CONT.

The map can be used to explore what infrastructure projects are planned in Elk Grove Village for the next eight years, and where they're happening.

Projects on the map have been organized into 6 categories: Facilities, Bicycle/Pedestrian, Major Road Projects, Street Resurfacing, Street Lights, and Aesthtetics. Tabs along the top of the map can be used to navigate to different map features for more information about projects in each




category. Clicking on a project's location will provide information about the anticipated project timeline.

Understanding Property Tax Rates

Every year, local taxing bodies determine the amount of money needed to provide services to citizens—this is called a tax levy. In order to collect this money, the county must divide the property tax levy among all of the properties that make up each taxing body. The county uses the Equalized Assessed Value (EAV) of each



property to determine what portion of the tax levy the property owner must pay.

EAV can change depending on market values and assessed values. Market values change based on actual property transactions, but assessed values can change based on successful property tax appeals, incentive-based property tax relief and property tax exemptions. Because the tax rate is calculated by dividing the Village's property tax levy by its total EAV, the tax rate can change from year to year, even if the Village keeps its property tax levy flat.

The Village has worked hard to keep its property tax levy stable and reduce the tax burden on its residents and businesses. The 2016 property tax levy (taxes payable in 2017) approved by the Village Board includes a slight decrease to the general fund levy. In order to collect that levy for the Village, Cook County divides the total EAV of all property in Elk Grove by the Village's tax levy to determine the Village's property tax rate. This tax rate is then multiplied by each property's EAV in order to determine the dollar amount owed to the Village.

Cook County must calculate this tax rate for all taxing districts in which you live. The total property tax rate on your bill is the sum of all the tax rates you will pay to all taxing districts where you live. Overall, the Village comprises approximately 10% of a typical resident's property tax bill, with 65-70% of the bill going toward school districts. The remainder of the property tax bill is made up by Cook County, townships and special taxing districts.

Residents and businesses in Elk Grove Village continue to experience the lowest combined property tax rate in northwest Cook County by an average of nearly \$1,131 lower compared to comparable communities for the most recent property tax bills.

TROUBLE WITH SKUNKS

Bordering the forest preserve, it is no surprise that we see so much wildlife activity near our homes. The Village's Environmental Health Division has recently received calls concerning skunk activity, which is higher than usual due to the recent mild winter. Skunks often become more active in the fall and are visible in the early morning and at dusk as the new adults venture out on their own to find new "territory". Skunks may burrow under buildings, sheds, decks or concrete stoops. They can raid garbage cans and dig holes in lawns in search of grubs.

Below are some tips on deterring skunks from your property:

- Do not leave out any food or water for animals, especially on the ground
- Secure garbage cans and close dumpster lids at night
- Control rodent and lawn grub populations
- Remove wood or brush piles
- Trim back bushes/vegetation overgrowth
- Seal openings under decks and sheds, cover window wells



Currently, there are no registered skunk repellents, but leaving on a radio, motion light, or strobe light near the burrow may deter skunks from your property. If you see a burrow hole under your deck or shed, do not seal it until you can ensure that all the skunks have exited. To check if the burrow is active, stuff the hole with newspaper or loose material to see if any of the material is pushed-out overnight. If you determine that you have skunks living on your property, the Health Division recommends working with a licensed wildlife removal company. Once the skunks are trapped and removed, the harborage hole can be secured with materials such as wire mesh, metal, wood, or concrete.



GET TO KNOW YOUR PROPERTY LINES

Knowing your property lines allows you to identify where to legally place structures such as fences, pools, sheds, garages and even compost piles. It can also assist in having good communication with your neighbors about where your property areas begin and end.

A plat of survey was provided to you at the time of purchase of your property. The plat of survey specifies the property corners and line measurements that separate your property from that of your neighbor's. It is important to store your survey in a safe and accessible location for your reference.

If you do not have survey, you may contact the Recorder of Deeds in your county to request a plat or hire a professional property surveyor to identify your property lines.





WINTER SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

Public Works stands ready to respond to this winter's freeze in a timely and expeditious manner. Our equipment has been prepared and salt supply has been secured. Residents and businesses play an important role in ensuring our streets are maintained in a clean and safe condition. We would like to thank everyone in advance for their cooperation, patience and understanding during the unpredictable winter season.



To help achieve a successful snow removal season please keep in mind these tips:

Parking Restrictions

When 2 or more inches of snow have fallen or are predicted to fall, do not park on any public street. Parked vehicles slow the progress of our snow removal fleet and often result in a section of roadway left unplowed. Parking is prohibited on both sides of a public street for 24 hours after the snowfall stops or until the clearing operation is complete.

** Be Considerate of Pedestrians and Seniors

Residents and businesses are asked to shovel their sidewalks, clearing a path for pedestrians. In addition, please assist your neighbors who may be unable to clear their walks.

Plowed-In Driveway Aprons

Snow removal equipment is designed to push snow to the parkway and unfortunately, pushing snow onto driveway aprons is unavoidable. Property owners can minimize the amount of snow pushed onto driveways by placing snow on their side of the sidewalk, as well as placing driveway apron snow in the parkway away from the flow of traffic to help our plows to push snow away from your driveway rather than onto it.

Do Not Push Snow Into Streets

Driveways and sidewalks should be cleared by placing the snow on your property or adjacent parkway. Pushing snow into the street creates hazardous driving conditions and negates the effort of our snow operation. It is unlawful to move snow from driveways or private parking lots onto Village streets or the right-of-way.

Drive Cautiously

Whenever practical, please stay off the roads during a heavy snowfall. If you must travel, drive slowly and cautiously. Please yield to snow removal equipment.

Don't Veer For Deer!

During mating season, deer will be more active and visible throughout the state. The risk for deer vs. vehicle crashes greatly increases in October, November and December, especially at dusk and dawn. Deer can dart in front of a vehicle in the blink of an eye. It's instinctual to swerve out of the way, but in doing so, drivers could lose control of the vehicle and cause a more severe crash. Follow these safe driving tips during mating season:

- Be aware of your surroundings and pay attention to deer crossing signs.
- Scan the sides of the road for eye shine the reflection of headlights in the eyes.
- Prepare for the unexpected. Deer can stop in the road or double back.
- Slow down if you see deer. They travel in groups, so more deer are likely nearby.
- If a collision is inevitable, try to glance the vehicle off the deer and avoid swerving into the opposite lanes of traffic.



SIGNAGE NOT PERMITTED ON PUBLIC PROPERTY



The Village would like to remind residents not to tape signage on public property. We work hard to maintain a high standard of facilities, structures and equipment which enhance neighborhood aesthetics.

It may seem harmless to tape signage such as lost pet notices, garage sale signs, or real estate signs, but tape and other materials cause significant damage to painted poles. The picture to the left shows the damage to a street sign pole from a recently posted sign.

Signs are not permitted on Village parkways, medians, streetlights, traffic signals, Village-owned signs, or trees. Illegal signs will be confiscated and offenders may be responsible for repair or replacement costs and fines in accordance with the Village Code.

ELK GROVE VILLAGE INDUSTRIAL VACANCY RATE CONTINUES TO REACH HISTORIC LOWS

Colliers International recently released its 2017 third quarter industrial vacancy report for the O'Hare Industrial Market. Colliers reported that Elk Grove Village's current vacancy rate is 3.17%, a historic low for the Village.

The Village's vacancy rate has continued to drop, and is down from 5.47% at the end of 2015. A vacancy rate of 5% is considered essentially full, taking into account natural vacancies for businesses that are moving in and out of properties.



Jeff Stagg, Lou Fyda and Randy Densberger of eWorks showed the Village representatives around their facility and explained that eWorks is a a 501(c)(3) "not for profit" organization which was established in 2009 to create employment opportunities for people with disabilities. eWorks does this by offering recycling,



refurbishment and resale services for office and industrial technologies and consumer electronics.

eWorks is located at 1201 Estes Street and accepts a variety of electronics free of charge, including computers, printers, cable boxes, DVD players, printer cartridges and more. Monitors and televisions are accepted for a small fee. Appliances are not accepted.

Illinois Route 390 Tollway Now Complete

On November 1, 2017, the eastern segment of Route 390 between I-290 and Illinois Route 83 was opened to traffic with all-electronic tolling. This segment completes the Illinois Route 390 Tollway Project, with three lanes in each direction between I-290 and Illinois Route 83, as well as four interchanges and three mainline collection points.

The new Illinois Route 390 is the first all-electronic roadway to open on the Illinois Tollway system. Route 390 features 30 bridges, the system-to-system interchange at I-290 and Illinois Route 390 and a reconstructed Rohlwing Road (Illinois Route 53) Interchange. New interchanges and local road improvements have been constructed at Park Boulevard, Arlington Heights Road, Prospect Avenue, Mittel Drive, Wood Dale Road, Lively Boulevard and Illinois Route 83. More than 13 lane miles of frontage roads have also been constructed to accommodate local traffic.



The next phase of construction for the Elgin O'Hare western access project will be on I-490, connecting Route 390 on the west side of the airport linking to the Tri-State Tollway in Franklin Park and the Jane Addams Tollway in Des Plaines. Sections of I-490 are currently in the design phase, with overall completion currently planned for 2025.
