RESIDENTIAL STREET LIGHT SANDBLASTING & PAINTING

This summer, the Village is sandblasting and repainting its residential street lights. The contractor hired to perform this work will begin in the southwest portion of the Village and continue throughout other residential areas as weather and time allows.

The sandblasting and painting process takes several days to complete. Containment and scaffolding are set up around the street light before the sandblasting begins. Once the sandblasting is completed, the paint primer is applied along with a top coat application. This process will be dusty and noisy at times, but when the job is complete, the protection for the light pole should be excellent.

This painting project is costly and new paint can be damaged by taping signs or notices to painted surfaces. Residents are asked not to tape any signs or announcements to any Village street lights or poles.

INSTALLATION OF SMALL WIRELESS FACILITIES

A new state law in Illinois was recently passed allowing telecommunication companies to add hardware to utility poles, light poles and other structures in the public right-of-way as wireless carriers implement 5G technology and enhance cellular transmission. The legislation severely restricts the ability of the Village to regulate these new devices, commonly known as "small cells", and antennas will soon be installed on structures throughout our community.

The Village Board has passed an ordinance implementing regulations and protections for the community to the degree permitted by the Small Wireless Facilities Deployment Act. The ordinance requires wireless telecommunications providers to submit permit applications and pay applicable fees up to the limits in state law for the use of the public right-of-way.

State law limits the Village's ability to place restrictions on proposed Small Wireless Facilities. The Village can require certain concealment measures to reduce visual impact, and propose alternate placements within 100 feet of a requested location. Otherwise, the Village must permit new facilities, whether as extensions on existing poles, or with the installation of new poles up to 45' in height, including in residential neighborhoods.

The Village will continue to work to protect the safety and quality of life for our residents, and we understand many residents may look forward to improved cellular transmission capabilities with access to new 5G technology. Free Electronics Drop-Off Locations!

Didn't make it to this years Electronic Recycling event? Village residents can recycle electronics at several permanent drop-off locations provided through the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC).

The following locations, some open year-round, are also FREE and often require NO WAITING to dispose of your electronics!

Glenview Transfer Station, 1151 N. River Road, Des Plaines Saturdays: 9:00 a.m. - 11:30 a.m., Open Year-Round



Permanent locations will be closed on holidays, as posted at www.swancc.org, where you can also find details on these drop-off locations and accepted materials.

In addition to SWANCC, private businesses such as eWorks Electronic Services also offer an electronic drop-off locations. Please note a fee is required to recycle televisions or monitors, other small electronics are accepted at no cost.

HOME RENOVATIONS

Are you considering a remodeling or expansion project? The Community Development Department will make every effort to assist you to make the permit and inspection process a positive experience. Below is a list of helpful steps to guide you through the process from beginning to end.

Step 1 - Make a list! Write down all of your ideas and goals for your home. You may also want to draw out your plans to get a visual idea of your renovation. Ask yourself the following questions: How do I want my house to look? Which rooms would I like to renovate first?

If you need help with the renovations, your next step is to find professional contractors to do the work.

Step 2 - Hire your contractor! Hiring a professional contractor is of utmost importance in order to protect your peace of mind and your renovation. Use online resources and reviews or ask your neighbors to see if they can refer you to a trustworthy contractor. It is recommended to obtain a minimum of three bids to compare price and scope of work along with asking for references to ensure the quality of work. Be leery of deals that sound too good to be true and always ask questions.



Step 3 - Get Permits! Once you have chosen your contractor, it is important that a construction permit is obtained from the Village. Be sure to have the contractor apply for all applicable building and/or engineering permits with the Village. Once permits are acquired, inspections will be performed by the Village to ensure the renovations are compliant with current code standards, and restoration practices. Ask questions and maintain open communication with your contactor and Village inspectors. At the end of your project, be sure to obtain a waiver of lien from the contractor as proof of payment in full. Following these three easy steps will help to make your projects a positive experience. RECYCLING NEWS & REMINDERS

Every day there are hundreds of tons of recycling material collected every day in our community. Unfortunately, a higher percentage of non-recyclable materials are being found in the recycling. That often happens by mistake or due to lack of information. Current recycling markets require clean, quality materials with virtually no contamination. With proper education and decision making, we can make a difference and ensure recycling is sustainable for generations to come.









Some of the most common contaminates that are found in the recycling stream include:

- Plastic bags, which often may be returned to retailers, are NOT accepted in single stream recycling.
- **Pizza boxes**, which contain residual grease, cheese or other toppings. Don't include food-soiled items and liquids--they can turn an entire load of recycling into trash.
- Bubble wrap and shrink wrap cause damage, down-time and costly repairs to recycling equipment.
- Electrical cords, string/rope material, rubber plastic hose, clothing. These items are called "tanglers" and can shut down an entire recycling plant!
- Propane tanks, batteries and electronic waste can start fires at the recycling plant.
- Medical equipment and devices of any kind, such as needles, tubing and gloves. Can cause injury to workers.

DARE GRADUATION AT GROVE JUNIOR HIGH

On June 1, the Elk Grove Police Department hosted DARE Graduation at Grove Junior High. Partnering with DARE America, the Crime Prevention Unit taught over 300 sixth grade students DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) curriculum over a six week period.

This curriculum highlights being safe and responsible with an emphasis on good decision making. Through role playing and critical thinking, the students learned about risk and consequences in the hopes they can apply their learning to real life situations. During the graduation several students were recognized for their participation and embodiment of the DARE spirit both in and out of the classroom.




BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVE FISCAL YEAR 2019 BUDGET

On April 24, 2018, the Mayor and Village Board approved the Fiscal Year 2019 Budget in the total amount of \$147,005,964. The General Fund Budget, which contains most of the Village's traditional services such as Fire, Police and Public Works, was approved at \$64,796,527.

Elk Grove Village is experiencing continued financial progress stability through an increase business development activity. The first quarter of 2018 industrial vacancy rate stands at a historic low 2.87%. As a result, the General Fund has experienced positive balances for the past several years. This is predominately resulting from rising sales taxes as well as building permit fees.

In December 2017, the Village annexed a greenfield subdivision to be developed as the "Elk Grove Technology Park"- an 85 acre light industrial development that includes the Busse Farm and neighboring properties. Construction commencing in the summer of 2018, with a planned 1.25 million new square footage of new industrial development.

The Village Board also eliminated the annual vehicle sticker program for residents in March of 2018. The economic success of the Village presented this opportunity to give back to the residents of Elk Grove Village. While we appreciate less-trying economic times, the Mayor, Village Board, and Village Staff continue to explore innovative methods of delivering services in a cost effective manner.

After celebrating its 60th birthday in 2016, the Village Board is planning for the future with a new capital program entitled: "Elk Grove 2025". This program is an 8-year, \$125 million capital investment program designed to prepare the community for its next 60 years. Thus far, the Biesterfield Public Works facility rehabilitation has been completed. Today, two new fire stations are in development (1 tear-down/rebuild on Meacham and 1 on a new site at 700 Fargo) along with a new Public Works garage on Devon Avenue. The construction of these projects should be completed at the end of Fiscal Year 2019.

In keeping with the Village's commitment to high and consistent standards, the Fiscal Year 2019 Budget was guided by the goal of enhancing customer service for both residents and the Village's business park. To that end, the recommended budget represents a value driven approach designed to increase the Village's flexibility to continue enhancing customer service. Over the past several fiscal years, the Village has laid the foundation for these initiatives.

The Fiscal Year 2019 Budget also includes a continuation of community events including the Mid-Summer Classics Concert series, which will feature five performances including one on the Fourth of July with a fireworks display, the annual Oktoberfest, and the annual Holiday Tree Lighting Ceremony.

SUMMER HEAT SAFETY

As summer temperatures begin to climb, below are a few reminders for days when excessive heat strikes.


Outdoor Activities

- During a heat wave, assess the need of the activity. Would it be wise to reschedule for a cooler day? If you must, limit your activity to cooler times of the day.
- Drink plenty of fluids before, during and after the activity. Sports drinks are helpful to replenish lost minerals through sweating. Avoid alcoholic and caffeinated beverages as they are counterproductive to rehydration.
- Wear lightweight and light-colored clothing to protect your skin and reflect away the heat.
 Sunscreen with an SPF above 15 will help to protect against harmful UV rays.

Stay Cool Indoors

- Select indoor activities on the hottest days.
 Trips to museums, movies and indoor shopping provide cool activities.
- The best way to beat the heat is to stay in cool areas. Do not rely on electric fans only to cool a location. Buildings will heat during the day. An indoor temperature above 90 degrees will not provide a safe environment.
- During prolonged heat, monitor the hydration and health of the very young and elderly. Both groups are more susceptible to heat related emergencies such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke.
- Be aware of family, friends and neighbors who do not have air-conditioning. They may not be using their home units because of high electricity costs, or inoperable units that are not working because of high repair costs.

Consider these summer heat safety tips for a great and enjoyable summer!



Adults over 65, children under 4, people with existing medica problems such as heart disease, and people without access to air conditioning

WHAT CAN YOU DO?



- Find an air-conditioned shelter
- Avoid direct sunlight
- Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing
- Take cool showers or baths
- Do not rely on a fan as your primary cooling device



STAY HYDRATED

- Drink more water than usual
- Don't wait until you're thirsty to drink more fluids
- Avoid alcohol or liquids containing high amouts of sugar
- Remind others to drink enough water



- Check local news for extreme heat alerts and safety tips
- Learn the symptoms of heat illness

ARE SPARKLERS REALLY SAFE?

Each year in the United States, more that 3,500 children and adults receive injuries from sparklers. Most people do not realize that the tip of the sparkler can burn up to as high as 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit. This temperature is hot enough to warp, melt and sag steel.

Many adults place a sparkler in the hands of a child, unaware of these dangers. The Elk Grove Village Fire Department reminds you to please be safe this summer.

Please be aware that when attending an event or program within Elk Grove Village that photos or video taken of you or your child it may be used for Village purposes.



MOSQUITO BITE PREVENTION

Summer time calls for enjoying the outdoors, but sometimes we don't enjoy the company of mosquitos. Below are some tips on mosquito bite prevention to consider this time of the year to protect yourself and your family from mosquito bites.

Use Insect Repellent

- Use an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)- registered insect repellent with one of the following active ingredients (DEET, Picaridin, IR3535, Oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol, or 2-undecanone).
- EPA-registered insect repellents are proven safe and effective, even for pregnant and breastfeeding women.
- If you are also using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and insect repellent second.
- Reapply insect repellent every few hours, depending on which product and strength you choose.

Mosquito-Proof Your Home

- Use screens on windows and doors. Repair holes in screens to keep mosquitos outside.
- Use air conditioning when available.
- Keep mosquitoes from laying eggs in and near standing water.

New Signal Improves Crossing For Cyclists at Ridge and Devon

The Village is excited to announce the installation of a modern radar detection system to allow bicyclists traveling north-south on Ridge Avenue to receive a green signal to cross Devon Avenue.

This intersection is part of the Salt Creek Bicycle Trail, and the old loop detection system meant that bicyclists had to wait for a car to get a green light, which could be especially difficult on weekends when there isn't much traffic on Ridge or Mittel.

The Village worked with the Cook County Department of Highways and Transportation to install this new system.

To receive the green signal bicycles should stop on the bicycle pavement marking behind the stop bar. This improvement should make for safer travels for bicycles using the Salt Creek Trail.

Green - Sewer

White - Proposed excavation

Pink - Temporary survey

JULIE is the Joint Utility Locate Information Exchange which notifies utilities in the area where digging will be done. The utility workers then locate any of their lines which may interfere with the digging. You must call at least two working days before you dig!

WATER/SEWER UTILITY BILL PAYMENT OPTIONS

Utility bills may be paid in person at the Municipal Complex, via mail, deposited in the drop box located near the entrance of the building or online from the convenience of your home computer at www.elkgrove.org and click on "Pay My Bill." The Village of Elk Grove also offers the convenience of automatically deducting payment of your water/sewer utility bill directly from your checking at no cost to you! With automatic bill pay there is no need to remember due dates, checks to be written or envelopes to be mailed.

In order to participate:

Please note the automatic bill payment feature may take up to two (2) billing cycles before the automatic deduction becomes active on your account. Your water/sewer utility bill will indicate if a payment is due or scheduled to be deducted on the day payment is due.
